- Have you ever been brave like the owl babies?
- What did you notice about the real owls while you watched?

Explore!

Go on a night-time walk to see whoooo's calling!

Here are some tips:

- Move slowly & quietly to not disturb wildlife.
- Listen up! Close your eyes and listen to the sounds around you. Cup your ears to hear even better! What do you hear? Where is each sound coming from?
 - You may not see an owl, but you very well could *hear* an owl
- If you don't see or hear any owls on your walk, that's okay! Learning where owls *aren't* is part of science too!

Write or draw about what you did or didn't see/hear on your walk. If you didn't see/hear owls, what did you see/hear?



Parent Tip:

Why should you explore plants and animals with young children?

"Early explorations of plants and animals... lay the foundation for your child's understanding of living things and how they change over time. They discover that all living things have needs... and depend on other living things and non-living things in their environment to meet their needs and survive." ([source](#))
